
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November has numerous holidays and celebrations. However, Veterans Day comes up to the top of the list. Veterans Day began as Armistice Day. It was created by President Woodrow Wilson in 1919 to commemorate the end of World War I. In 1938, November 11th became the legal holiday dedicated to World War I veterans. After World War II and the Korean War, veteran service organizations pushed for a more inclusive holiday, leading Congress to change Armistice Day to Veterans Day in 1954, honoring all American veterans for their service to the citizens of the United States.

In this article, we will examine the Masonic Presidents who have honorably served our military and citizens. I did not include President Lyndon Johnson even though he served in our military and was initiated as an entered apprentice in 1937. He obviously did not take our fraternity seriously as he never tried to receive the rest of our degree during the following 36 years of his life.



George Washington's military career spanned

four decades and two major conflicts: the French and Indian War and the American Revolutionary War. Washington began as a major in the Virginia militia, rising to commander. Washington then led the Continental Army to victory in the American Revolution, serving our military for our independence.


Washington was initiated into Freemasonry in 1752, advancing through the three degrees to become a Master Mason by August 1753. He remained an active and prominent Freemason throughout his life, eventually serving as the first Master of Alexandria Lodge Number 22 and officiating the laying of the cornerstone for the U.S. Capitol in 1793. Washington's Masonic career was a notable part of his private and public life, with our fraternity playing a major role in his social advancement and national service.



James Monroe served in the Continental Army

during the American Revolutionary War, enlisting in 1775. He was commissioned as a lieutenant, fought in key battles like the Battle of Trenton where he was severely wounded, and rose to the rank of captain. He also served as an aide-de-camp to Lord Stirling and was present at Valley Forge and the Battle of Monmouth. After the war, he continued to serve in the Virginia Militia with the rank of colonel.

Monroe began his Masonic career in 1775 as a 17-year-old student at William and Mary College, initiated into Williamsburg Lodge Number 6, and continued his membership until the 1780s, joining Fredericksburg Lodge Number 4 later on. His Masonic journey reflects a commitment to public service and national unity, ideals also embraced by other influential leaders of the era.




James K. Polk had a limited, non-combat military career, serving as a captain in the Tennessee militia in the 1820s. However, his legacy is tied to his role as Commander-in-Chief during the Mexican American War, in which he aggressively directed military strategy to achieve his expansionist goals.

James K. Polk was an active Freemason throughout his career, serving as a lodge officer and participating in Masonic ceremonies during his presidency. He was initiated into the fraternity in 1820, long before he became the 11th President of the United States.

James Buchanan's military career consisted of service in the Pennsylvania militia during the War of 1812, where he participated in the defense of Baltimore. He joined a cavalry unit to help defend the city against British advances and was honorably discharged after the war.




James Buchanan joined Lancaster Lodge Number 43, in Pennsylvania in 1816, and served as its Worshipful Master in 1825. He later became Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania. Buchanan remained an active Freemason, finding camaraderie and purpose in its principles of brotherhood and service, and his lodge supported him during threats after his presidency.



Andrew Johnson's military career was primarily

primarily as a political appointee rather than a career soldier. He was named military governor of Tennessee by President Abraham Lincoln during the Civil War, serving from 1862 to 1865.

Andrew Johnson was initiated into Freemasonry in 1851 at Greeneville Lodge No. 119 in Tennessee and became a Knight Templar in 1859. He achieved his Royal Arch degree and was a Scottish Rite Mason, famously becoming the first U.S. President to receive the Scottish Rite degrees while in office, which occurred in the White House in 1867. Johnson remained a proud Freemason throughout his life.



James A. Garfield served as a high-ranking officer in the Union Army during the Civil War, rising from lieutenant colonel to major general and leading his troops in notable battles such as Middle Creek and Shiloh. After distinguishing himself as a soldier and serving as chief of staff to Major General William S. Rosecrans, Garfield resigned from the military to take his seat in the U.S. House of Representatives in 1863, a position from which he was later elected president.


James A. Garfield began his Masonic journey on November 19, 1861, in Columbus, Ohio, becoming a Master Mason in 1864. He was an active member in several lodges, including becoming a charter member of Pentalpha Lodge Number 23, in Washington, D.C. Garfield also advanced in appendant bodies like the York Rite (Knights Templar) and the Scottish Rite. His Masonic affiliations continued through his presidency, with his Knights Templar commandery serving as his honor guard during his inauguration.

William McKinley served as a citizen soldier in the Civil War, enlisting as a private and rising to the rank of brevet major by the end of the war, serving under future President Rutherford B. Hayes. He displayed bravery at battles like Antietam and was noted for his service in bringing rations under fire and his actions at the Battle of Cedar Creek. After the war, he also led the nation in the Spanish-American War as president, though this was a political, not a military command, following failed negotiations for Cuban independence.



William McKinley's Masonic career began in 1865 when he was inspired to join Freemasonry after witnessing the fraternal bond between Union and Confederate soldiers during the Civil War, joining Hiram Lodge Number 21, in Winchester, Virginia. He continued his active participation by affiliating with Canton Lodge Number 60, and becoming a charter member of Eagle Lodge Number 431 (later renamed William McKinley Lodge) in Canton, Ohio. He also advanced through the Capitular degrees and became a Knight Templar, remaining a devoted member of the craft until his death.





Theodore Roosevelt's military career is defined by his celebrated command of the "Rough Riders" during the Spanish-American War, an experience that catapulted him to national fame. Though it was his only combat service, his enthusiasm for military preparedness and the "strenuous life" influenced his policies as president.


Theodore Roosevelt joined Freemasonry in 1901, initiating as an Entered Apprentice in Matinecock Lodge in New York and quickly advancing to Master Mason later that year, shortly before becoming President of the United States. During his presidency and afterward, he remained an active Freemason, visiting lodges globally, participating in cornerstone ceremonies, and embodying Masonic virtues of integrity and public service in his progressive policies.



Harry S. Truman served in the U.S. Army during World War I, rising to the rank of captain and commanding Battery D of the 129th Field Artillery in France. After an initial period in the National

Guard, he was commissioned as a first lieutenant when his unit was federalized for World War I. As captain, Truman's leadership qualities were recognized, and he led his men through heavy combat in the Meuse-Argonne Offensive, famously ensuring his unit emerged from the war without losing any soldiers. His transformative military experience, particularly his combat leadership, provided him with a foundation for his later political career.

Harry Truman had an extensive Masonic career, becoming a Master Mason in 1909, serving as Grand Master of Missouri from 1940 to 1941, and ultimately receiving the 33rd-degree Sovereign Grand Inspector General designation in the Scottish Rite in 1945. He was deeply dedicated to the Craft, organizing lodges, completing degrees in the Scottish and York Rites, and receiving the Gourgas Medal, the highest honor of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.



Gerald Ford served in the U.S. Navy Reserve during World War II, joining in 1942 and serving on active duty until 1946, reaching the rank of Lieutenant Commander. He served aboard the light aircraft carrier USS Monterey (CVL-26), participating in major South Pacific operations. After the war, he remained in the Naval Reserve until 1963 and received an honorable discharge from active duty.

Gerald Ford had an extensive Masonic career, joining in 1949 and advancing to the 33rd degree of the Scottish Rite by 1962, becoming an Honorary Member of the Supreme Council. He was a devoted Mason, a member of Malta Lodge Number 465, in Grand Rapids, Michigan, and Columbia Lodge Number 3, in Washington, D.C. Ford's lifelong commitment to Masonic principles influenced his presidency, reflecting his belief in honesty, healing, and civic duty.





This month we move on to the Past Master degree. It is fitting, it seems, that we cover this degree in a month where we are seeing so much change around us. The "passing" of one Master to another is something to be celebrated as an annual occurrence of auspicious solemnity. Enjoy!

#### Grand Chapter Capitular Education Series - November 2025 (Virtual) Past Master Degree

The (Virtual) Past Master degree is one of the shortest degrees in the overall time it takes to confer the degree. But that shouldn't mean that it is brushed over or rushed through haphazardly. The "lecture" given to the candidate, as he is provided with the implements and regalia of a Master of a Lodge, is one of the most powerful statements in our Craft. In it, the candidate is directed on how to govern a Lodge under his care.

I have often wondered why this degree is no longer given as a chair degree to all newly elected and installed Masters of symbolic Lodges. It would be fitting given the situation. And it would be relevant to the task in which they are about to undertake.

The ceremony of installation for the Grand Lodge of Missouri allows room for impromptu additions to installing the officers. I can see where some of the points made in the Past Master degree could be inserted into that ceremony, without giving away the entire degree.

Something to consider...

In this reading, you have been given the entire Chapter along with:

- Multiple Choice Test
- Open-ended question:
  - ♦ What do you think about the (virtual) Past Master Degree?
  - ♦ Should there be a degree which gives away the Secrets of the Chair to a person who hasn't served as Worshipful Master?
  - Should we have the Degree at all couldn't the United States simply follow other countries and allow anyone who is a Master Mason to become a Royal Arch Mason without going through the Past Master degree? (meaning, only confer three degrees rather than four)

#### Our education series will follow this schedule:

November 2025: Past Master Degree, with quiz and open ended question

December 2025: Most Excellent Master Degree

January 2026: Most Excellent Master Degree, completion including quiz and open-ended question

February 2026: Royal Arch Degree


March 2026: Royal Arch Degree, continues April 2026: Royal Arch Degree, continues

May 2026: Royal Arch Degree, completion including quiz and open-ended question

**June 2026:** Wrap up of education for the year and a short expose on a passage of scripture from the Royal Arch Degree ritual from the role of Jeshua, the High Priest.

This schedule may not fit all Chapters perfectly, but it is suggested that your members come prepared with a copy of The Beacon in hand, print or digital, to your meetings so that they may take part in the group readings and discussion that follows.

## **Virtual Past Master Degree**

#### **Background of the Past Master Degree**

The origins of the Past Master Degree are lost in history, and it is probably as old as the Entered Apprentice and Fellowcraft Degrees. From what can be gleaned, from the earliest times, when a Master was installed in the Chair to preside over a Lodge, there was a short ceremony, usually performed only in the presence of other Past Master, in which he possibly took a further Obligation, and was entrusted with a grip and word known only to Past Masters. It is generally believed that this ceremony might have its roots in Operative Lodges, where it would be expected that, given the close attachment to the Church, there would be some kind of ceremony and blessing when a Brother was elected to preside over his Lodge.

In Scotland, indeed, the Installed Master's Degree was not even introduced until 1870 by the Earl of Rosslyn, from the English Ritual. In a declaration of 1846, it was categorically stated that 'The Grand Lodge further considers every Master Mason qualified to be elected to and fill the chair as R.W. Masons without receiving any additional

secrets whatever.'




The Earl of Rosslyn

This sort of Ritual was known by a number of different names, including the Secrets of the Chair, Paster Master, Passed Master, and Installed Master. The term 'Past Master' is further confused by the fact that a Master-elect could be said to be receiving the Paster Master degree, when the term Past Master strictly applies to a Master who has served his Lodge for the specified period, and has now vacated the East.

We have learned that the earliest form of the Royal Arch Degree was open only to Past Masters, and it quickly became evident that, given the small number of Past Masters, this important system of teaching Masonic secrets was in imminent danger of becoming extinct. It was among the Antients firstly, that a Degree which conferred the Secrets of the Chair upon worthy and well qualified Master

Masons was worked, which would entitle them to receive the Royal Arch Degree; while the Premier Grand Lodge continued to confer a Past Master Degree upon those elected as Master of their Lodge. Following the Act of Union between the Antients and Moderns in 1913, the United Grand Lodge of England took control and limited the ceremony of Installation to duly elected Masters of Lodges only. From that time the requirement for membership of a Royal Arch Chapter was reduced to being a Master Mason for a determined period of time.




The first documented mention of a Paster Master's Degree is found in Anderson's Constitutions of 1723, six years after the founding of the Premier Grand Lodge, but also the time that the first Grand Secretary was appointed, and proper records began to be kept. The first mention of the Past Master Degree in connection with Capitular Masonry was in Bolton, England in 1768, when the minutes mention that nine Brothers received the Royal Arch Degree, despite not having served in the Chair as Master of a Lodge.

In the United Stated, it is believed that the first known mention is the working of the Excellent Degree in St. Andrew's Royal Arch Lodge in 1769, Boston Massachusetts. When St. Andrew's and King Cyrus Chapters met in 1795 to standardize their Chapter Degrees, the records of St. Andrew's Chapter reported the working of the Past Master and Most Excellent Master Degrees in place of their Excellent and Super Excellent Degrees. Many scholars are certain this simply reflects a name change, and that his indicates the Excellent Degree practiced by them was in fact a Past Master Degree.

Naturally, given the Past Master Degree was adopted as part of the series of Capitular Degrees by General Grand Chapter resolved: "This body does not claim jurisdiction over the degree of Past Master, when about to be conferred on a Master-elect of a subordinate Lodge.

Nature, and the inventive Mason, abhors a

vacuum, and during the 1800s it appears the Degree of Past Master become increasingly elaborate and ribald, finally leading the General Grand Chapter under its General Grand High Priest, Charles Gilman of Marylan, to revise the Ritual in 1856. Alber Gallatin Mackey, his successor, commented in his Book of the Chapter (pub. 1858): "One of the evils resulting from the disseverance of the Past Master's degree from its legitimate position as a part of the installation service in a symbolic lodge, was the introduction of a number of ceremonies into the Chapter degree...At length a powerful effort was made to divest the degree of those offensive ornaments which had been gradually fastened upon it, and to restore it, as nearly as possible, to its original simplicity."

That the Degree had become 'offensive' was reflected by Edmund Ronayne, writing in his 1879 expose of Freemasonry: "Notwithstanding this recommendation, the subordinate Chapter throughout the country continued to indulge in almost unlimited buffoonery in conferring this degree...I received this degree of Past Master twice, first in the Chapter on which occasion all kinds of stupid horse-play were indulged in at my expense..."

The revised Ritual intended "to abridge the ceremonies now conferred in the Past Master's degree within the narrowest constitutional limits, only retaining the induction of the candidate into the Oriental Chair, and communicating the means of recognition."

The current ritual reflects this minimalism, and the Degree is comparatively short, certainly in comparison with the now elaborate ritual conducted by a Board of Past Masters in the English Emulation Ritual. While some States no longer confer any kind of Past Master Degree, New York still holds a Board of Installed Masters in a side room prior to installing the Master-elect of a Symbolic Lodge, at which he

takes his Obligation and is entrusted with the Grip and Word of a Past Master.

Unusually, the Past Master Degree performed by Ancient Chapter No. 1 in New York may still contain some of the elements referred to by Mackey, since the Ritual includes a short scene which most certainly places the Candidate seated in the Oriental Chair in an embarrassing situation. Of course, what may have been considered ribald at the time is now seen as a quaint preservation of historical ritual!

In 1942, an additional part to the Degree, called The Allegory, composed by E.:. Howard, L. M. Jones, Past High Priest of Unity Chapter No. 16 located in Dayton, Ohio, was approved for optional adoption in the Virtual Past Master degree by General Grand Chapter; and it is the Appendix to this Course.

#### Differences between an Actual and Virtual Past Master

Given that a Past Master Degree is practiced within a Chapter, however similar it may be in form to that practiced within the Blue Lodge system, in 1853, it was categorically declared to be unconnected with the latter Degree, as it was necessary to distinguish between the two forms of the Past Master Degree practiced in Capitular and Symbolic Masonry.

Some research has suggested that there may at one time have been differences in the secrets conferred, either a slight variation in grip or password, to ensure that nobody receiving the Past Master Degree as a prelude to receiving the Royal Arch degree could gain entrance to a Lodge of Past Masters about to confer their version upon a Masterelect. In the United States, at least, this possible difference, if it ever existed, has disappeared over time, and there is now no substantial difference between the two Rituals, other than the fact that, in the Blue Lodge setting, obedience to the Grand Lodge, its Constitutions, Laws and Edicts is sworn; and the ancient penalties are omitted. Also, only the grip and word are given. In Blue Lodge, the Charge, and the presentations of gavel, Constitutions, Charter and gavel are done in presence of the whole Lodge at the Installation Ceremony (and sometimes non-Masonic visitors if an open Installation is conducted).

Another difference is in the name. While the ceremony within a Lodge created a Past Master (sometimes referred to as an Actual Past Master), the ceremony within Capitular Masonry creates a Virtual Past Master. This is to indicate that he has not been elected by a Lodge to serve over them, nor has he

been required to meet the other prerequisites such as having served as a Warden. Because of this he cannot serve as a Master in a Blue Lodge, nor expect to receive any of the rights and privileges associated with that honor. These include conferring the Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft or Master Mason Degrees, being invited to a seat in the East, or being received in a Blue Lodge as a Past Master. Similarly, many of the duties of a Past Master Recited in the chapter are not in fact relevant to a Virtual Past Master (such presiding at dedications, consecrations, the laying of cornerstone, and presiding at funeral services).

#### **Variations Can Lead to Embarrassing Situation!**



Unfortunately, the variations in requirements to receive-and to observe- the Royal arch Degree can lead to embarrassment when visiting other countries. For example, while any American Master Mason can, by virtue of receiving the Virtual Past Master Degree, receive the Royal Arch Degree, and thereby rise through the offices to become High Priest of his Chapter, in England and Ireland, while any Master Masons may become a Royal Arch Mason, only those who have sat as Master of a Lodge may be elected to the three principle positions of the Council - Scribe, King or High Priest. An English Mason would find it most confusing that an American Mason could be a Past High Priest yet not Past Master of a Lodge. Another source of much confusion is that, in the Dogmatic Ritual (practiced in England and her Commonwealth, including Canada), the Grand Council are called the Three Principal Officers – and the most senior one is 'Z', or Zerubbabel the King. 'J' or Jeshua the High Priest is the second in line. And the sign given on entering retiring is uniquely given with the left, and not the right hand in the English Royal Arch!



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This can lead to problems when an English Royal Arch Mason wishes to visit an American Chapter. In theory, there are a few areas of concern. Firstly, if he is not a Past Master, he will not have received the Past Master Degree — and indeed in most jurisdictions receiving the Past Master Degree in a Blue Lodge is for some reason not considered a substitute for receiving the 'expedient' version in the Capitular Degrees! Secondly, since it is an entirely separate Body, he may not be a Mark Master Mason. Finally, since the Most Excellent Master degree forms part of what we call the Cryptic Council, he probably won't have received that either.

A key issue is the fact that only Paster Masters can invoke the Great and Sacred Name under a Living Arch and over a Triangle. In English Chapter, the three Principal Officers raise the Arch, give the words and lower the Arch while the rest of the Companions watch. An English Royal arch Mason is therefore not equipped to participate in our Openings and Closings.

The situation is similarly confusing for the English visiting a Scottish Chapter. Not only are the Mark and Excellent Mast Degrees prerequisites, the English Royal Arch Mason will not be permitted into the Chapter until he was 'taken the Veils', since the Ceremony of the Veils only exists in the 'time immemorial' ritual confined to a few Lodges in Bristol, and the Dogmatic Ritual practiced elsewhere does not use veils. On the other hand, the fact that the Scottish Constitution does not require one to be a Past Master in order to receive – or confer – the Royal Arch Degree, has also led to some difficult situations in the past, since this creates a situation in which a high priest who has neither sat as Master of a Lodge nor received the Virtual Past Master Degree can confer the Royal arch degree, whose validity would be questioned both under the English and general Grand Chapter Constitutions!

There are just a few examples of the many differences which can lead to embarrassment, or possibly worse, a violation of our own Obligations if we allow those who have not yet taken certain Obligations to see the working and receive the signs and words. In all cases it is best to contact the Grand Secretary's Office to double check the situation regarding a visitor, if any notice of an impending visit has been given. In the New York Jurisdiction, a recent change was made to the constitution to ensure the Mark, Past Master, Most Excellent Master and Royal Arch Degrees are given in that order: yes, it was discovered that a Chapter had conferred the Degrees in a random order!

The General Grand Chapter has a provision in its Constitution that if a person presents himself form another jurisdiction a a Royal Arch Mason, he may receive the preceding three Degrees in order to heal him and allow him to attend a meeting of Chapter without charge or capitation fee. However, this is impractical in most instances, since the visitor probably would not be around for the length of time required to put on the Mark, Past Master and Most Excellent Master Degrees.

When investigating a prospective visitor to a Chapter, if they hail from a jurisdiction other than one under the auspices of General Grand Chapter, you now understand that there are a number of precautions which must be taken, all the while ensuring that you in no manner offend the prospective visitor. If, for example, the visitor is a Principle or Past Principal, he may be invited to

attend the conferral of the Royal Arch Degree. It is up to the High Priest whether a visitor who is not a Past Master should be allowed to attend a Royal Arch Degree, and in any event, he may only observe, and not participate in the ceremony. Nobody outside the jurisdiction of the General Grand Chapter should attend the Opening and Closing of a Royal Arch Lodge, since they will not be in possession of the intervening signs and due guards of the 4th to 7th Degrees.

If a person has moved to the United States and intends to affiliate with a Chapter, it is best if they simply go through the Degrees here, so that they might be best prepared to both learn all the Signs and Due Guards, and so that the Certificate they receive will allow them free entry into any Chapter under the purview of the General Grand Chapter.

#### **Lessons of the Past Master Degree**

The Address to the Candidate expressly states that: "The Past Master's Degree, unlike all the other Degrees in Freemasonry, sheds no light upon itself." It later states: "Our candidates are made to pass the Chair simply as a preparation and qualification towards being invested with the solemn instructions of the Royal Arch."

However, it would not be strictly accurate to say that undergoing a ceremony which, symbolically at least, prepares you to preside over a Lodge is without teaching. Whether or not the Candidate actually has to go through the work of planning and running an efficient Lodge, the very act of taking an Obligation, and focusing on the accoutrements with which he is furnished provide a number of points for meditation.

Indeed, it is to be hoped that there is something to be learned in this Degree. The Address tells us that "it was doubtful to many if it (the Past Master Degree) could legally be abolished, and, the law still requires that the August degree of Royal Arch shall be restricted Part Masters." However, this statement is not strictly true, since a number of jurisdictions have removed the Degree yet their members are still recognized by jurisdictions which have not. It would also seem tragic if what was considered a meaningless ceremony was blindly followed from century to century which had no discernible use at all, simply because of blind tradition.

One author has described the lesson inculcated in this Degree as "responsible leadership." It teaches that moderation, decorum and justice are essential for the fair exercise of Masonic leadership, and since the Capitular Degrees are intended to make the Brothers ever more tied to the beloved Craft and teaches them to lead their younger and less enlightened Brethren through leadership, example and education, this Degree would seem to be a moment of stillness for the Candidate to reflect upon those important attributes.



The emblem of the square is worn about the neck, rather than being presented to him as a Working Tool or indicated upon the Holy Bible. It is to remind the Master forcibly that it is upon himself he must take up the work and assume it himself in order to lead by example.

The threefold cord is likewise a reminder that, while the follower offers of himself, he must offer twice as much to help the newly-made Masons to achieve his goals. In some interpretations, it manifests a lesson indicated earlier – the Capitular Degrees emphasize a transition from the physical basis of the Symbolic Degrees to a Spiritual nature. Thus the Master offers an addition, spiritual level to the grip to raise the Candidate up to a higher plane.

In particular, it reminds us that we are bound by three kinds of law: the Law of Self, the Law of Man, and the Law of God.

The Law of Self is that circumscribing of passions we learned in the First Degree, the need to control ourselves in order to make us fit citizens of society and a help to our fellow man.

The Law of Man is represented by the presentation of the Constitutions and Bylaws, which teach us that, as members of society, we should both abide by and as Master enforce those rules which mankind has commonly agreed to follow.

Finally, by pointing once more to the Volume of the Sacred Law and invited to study and follow its precepts, we are reminded that the most sublime Law is God's, and if all our actions are calculated to do His will, we will never falter.




Figure 47 - The Past Master

## Retention Corner

What Does your Council retention program look like? Do you have a retention committee like your Grand Body?

The Illustrious Master of your Council has the power to appoint special committees during their term of office. However, you may not need these special committees. As we spoken before, each Council has that individual dynamic that works for some but not others. In having a plan for retention, you should at a minimum outlook on On-boarding, Communication, Recognition, Awards, and Snail Mail (OCRASM).

A good first impression is always important and lasting. So, it is important to provide the best ritual that we can do. It should be our goal to make sure that the candidates receive the best degrees possible. Additionally, the Top Liner signer and/or knowledgeable Brother should be present to help direct the candidate's experience in a way to make sure that they understand what they have just experienced. When those degree have been completed, we should have the necessary paraphernalia available that they may have the opportunity to purchase the necessary supplies that they need. This is the reason behind having packets, coins, jewels and other items available at the completion of their degrees. We should provide a strong initial Masonic education as well. When we have what they need, they will feel important to our Fraternity.

A communication plan is also needed. It is a top priority. When necessary, it should include feedback of the kindest nature. This year your Grand Committee on Retention, which includes your RDGMs, have been testing your Councils health and returning reports. This is to assist your organization in the areas in which you might need to improve. We have taken every avenue to present that information in a kindest and gentlest of manners. I have always said that "Feedback is a Gift" and it should be taken as such. Instinctively we fight negative feedback, our first goal may be to debate and argue that information. However, engaging in objective selfreflection often helps us and our organization to improve and grow. Take this health report with a positive mindset as the committee decides its value and shares it with each Council. Our intention is to

help you improve and strive successfully forward. We are currently reviewing how this information will be used.

Let's look at your communications to the members. We have members without email or social media. Sometimes someone can only be reached by phone or snail mail. Determine your members preferences and implement it into you regular operations. You can set up a text list, email chain, and a telephone roster. I do not check emails very often, so texting me will get you a faster response. You may have a member in an assisted living facility or home bound. Please call them. A phone call can change a day of misery to that of joy and help pass the gift of Freemasonry forward. I know of a blue lodge and a lady's organization that does just that. What a great way for older members to keep up to date with events. By working in this manner, members you may have never met may become fun and active people who may help benefit your Council, and as an additional benefit, suspensions may go way down. Take advantage of our retirees. They may have the freedoms to assist in this communication process.

Are you represented on social media? I have always run a public page for announcements and events and provide a private group for member posts. Who are your active social media people? Look at the nature of the chosen members posts and provide instruction as to not cast any aspersions on this venerable institution. In other words, choose your representative wisely. These social platforms provide tips and tricks to assist members. Once your page is up, tell your story often, show pictures, and get your members to share their posts so that others may see.

In the days of my military service the standard was that you were recognized only when you messed up. The other stuff was considered doing your job. Today, we call much of that "toxic leadership". Barking orders and dressing someone down can result in the worst results to our Fraternity. Even if you still believe in that stuff, it should stay in the military, not in the lodge rooms. We are in a VOLUNTEER organization. There are a lot of them out there, and we are all competing for the same people. We must recognize our members. Encourage

them to not only do more but shows that you appreciate them. Many of them will attend where they are appreciated the most and exclude those places where they are not respected.

Awards are a wonderful way to recognize our members for their hard work. As their leader, it is your responsibility to get your members and Councils their awards. If your Council has received an award, your members will proudly share their successes with others. Those awards should be worn by those individuals and when seen we should comment and congratulate the receiver of their great success. ## Royal Arch Research Assistance (RARA) – FAQs

Q: What exactly does RARA fund?

A: RARA funds scientific research on Central Auditory Processing Disorder (CAPD) through grants to early career researchers at universities and medical centers. We don't fund treatment centers or hospitals directly, but rather the scientists discovering new treatments and diagnostic methods.

## Q: How is RARA different from other hearing related charities?

**A:** Most hearing charities focus on deafness or hearing loss. RARA specifically targets CAPD, where hearing is normal but the brain can't process sound correctly. It's a unique focus area with limited funding sources.

## Q: Who reviews research grant applications?

**A:** RARA partners with the Hearing Health Foundation, which uses a rigorous peer review process with medical experts. Only the most promising research receives funding.

## Q: How much does RARA give in grants each year?

A: RARA awards approximately \$500,000 annually in research grants, typically funding 10-12 researchers per year at \$40,000-\$50,000 per grant.

## Q: What is the leverage ratio?

**A:** RARA grants serve as "seed funding" that helps researchers qualify for much larger federal grants. On average, every \$1 RARA donates results in \$27 of total research funding. This multiplier effect maximizes our impact.

#### Q: Has RARA research led to actual treatments?

**A:** Yes. RARA funded research has contributed to:

- ⇒ New diagnostic protocols now used in clinics nationwide
- ⇒ Non-surgical treatment options for children with CAPD
- ⇒ Better understanding of CAPD's relationship to autism
- ⇒ Reduced need for invasive procedures

#### Q: How long has RARA been around?

**A:** RARA was established in 1974 at the General Grand Chapter Triennial meeting. Over 50 years of supporting research that changes lives.

## Q: Is my donation tax-deductible?

**A:** Yes. RARA is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization. EIN: 23-7410576. You'll receive a tax receipt for your donation.

## Q: Can I designate my donation in memory of someone?

**A:** Absolutely. Memorial and honor gifts are welcome. We'll send acknowledgment to the family and recognize the memorial in our records.

#### Q: Does RARA help adults or just children?

**A:** While CAPD often presents in childhood, research helps all ages. Many veterans with traumatic brain injury experience CAPD like symptoms. RARA research benefits everyone affected.

## Q: What percentage of donations goes to research?

**A:** RARA operates with minimal overhead through volunteer leadership and General Grand Chapter support. Approximately 92% of donations go directly to research funding.

#### Q: Can non-Masons donate to RARA?

**A:** Yes. While RARA is sponsored by Royal Arch Masons, donations from anyone are welcome and appreciated.

## Q: What happens if I sign up for monthly giving and need to stop?

**A:** You can cancel anytime with a simple phone call or email. No questions asked, no hassles. We understand circumstances change.

## Q: How does Missouri's fundraising compare to other states?

**A:** Missouri has tremendous potential. Some states raise \$50,000+ annually. With 30+ chapters and thousands of members, Missouri can become a top contributor to RARA research.

#### THE PROBLEM

Arteriosclerosis is a disease affecting the blood vessels which carry blood from the heart to all parts of the body. It is commonly called "hardening of the arteries", and is a process which results in the narrowing of these vessels. It is gradually progressive, and eventually interferes with the flow of blood. When an artery supplying the muscle of the heart is affected severely in this manner, it results in a heart attack. When a major artery supplying the brain is involved it results in a stroke; if the large artery of the leg is greatly narrowed by this process, gangrene occurs (the tissue dies) and the leg often has to be amputated, as the only method of satisfactory treatment.

#### THE WORK OF CRYPTIC MASONS

Freemasonry seeks to improve the community by improving the individual. Therefore, Councils of Cryptic Masons are found working with Lodges, Chapters, and Commanders, giving more opportunities to improve one's skills in leadership, public speaking, interpersonal relationships, and administration. common denominator of blood vessels, so vascular research is a vital part of treating many different kinds of illnesses. Supporting the ICVBM's research has the potential to help millions of people.

## THE INDIANA CENTER FOR VASCULAR BIOLOGY AND MEDICINE

The Indian Center for Vascular Biology and Medicine is committed to researching mechanisms of vascular wellness and disease, and to developing leading-edge medical therapies to improve the care of patients with vascular problems. The ICVBM includes more than 40 investigators from a range of basic and clinical disciplines, and approaches vascular research and development from a highly cross-disciplinary perspective. This faculty, as well as the staff and students, work together as a team to complete the primary mission of rapid development and clinical application of new interdisciplinary research in vascular biology. The ICVBM emphasizes reaching patients as quickly as possible so that they can benefit from ongoing developments of gene, molecular, cell- and devicebased therapies.

Since 1986, CMMRF has been working with Indiana University & ICVBM. The foundation funds the research & since its inception has contributed more than \$4,500,000 to ICVBM.

The mission of the Knights Templar Eye Foundation, Inc. is to provide assistance to those who face loss of sight due to the need for surgical treatment without regard to race, color, creed, age, sex, or national origin provided they are unable to pay or receive adequate assistance from current government agencies or similar sources and to provide funds for research in curing diseases of the eye. This includes the correction of strabismus (cross-eyes) in children up to the age of 16 years.

Funds for the operation of the Eye Foundation are obtained in part from an annual assessment of each Knight Templar, contributions made by Masons from throughout the Masonic Family, fund-raising activities, memorials, wills and bequests, and donations from endowment funds or similar sources. Special award programs for contributions include the Grand Master's Sword of Merit (\$25,000), Golden Chalice (\$10,000), Grand Master's Club (\$1,000), Grand Commander's Club (\$1,000 in \$100 annual installments), Patron Certificate (\$100), Associate Patron Certificate (\$50), and Life Sponsor (\$30). Those who are designated as a Life Sponsor or above are relieved from the annual assessment.

Since 1956, over \$98 million has been spent on approved cases, and applications have been received from 80,000 people. Research Grants totaling in excess of \$9.2 million have been awarded to researchers working in the fields of Pediatric Ophthalmology and Ophthalmic Genetics.

Application for assistance from the Foundation can be made through a Knight Templar who is a member of one of over 1.200 Constituent Commanderies the Grand of Encampment. The Knights Templar Eye Foundation, Inc. is a co-sponsor of the Seniors Eye Care Program (formally known as the National Eye Care Project) with Eye Care America, a Public Service Foundation of the American Academy of Ophthalmology. The Seniors Eye Care Program helps those persons 65 years or over who do not have an Ophthalmologist. Anyone wishing to contact the Seniors Eye Care Program may do so by calling 1- 800-222-EYES and telling them you were referred by a Knight Templar.

The Knight of Siloam special award program in Missouri was created by Sir Knights J. Edward Blinn, REPGC, and Danny L. Ferguson, REPGC, during the 93-94 Templar year as a means of recognizing those Missouri Sir Knights who make substantial contributions to the Knights Templar Eye Foundation, and to encourage others to do so. A special medal and patent is presented to those who donate \$500.00 or more to KTEF either in a lump sum or in installments. The jewel is designated as a meritorious service jewel and may be worn on the Knight.



The Knights Templar Educational Foundation, Division of the Grand Commandery of the State of Missouri, provides financial assistance in the way of low cost student loans to college juniors and seniors, as well as trade school students.



The Missouri Holy Land Pilgrimage Fund is used to pay the expenses of sending a Minister to the Holy Land under the provisions of the Grand Encampment. The Holy Land Pilgrimage Committee of the Grand Commandery can provide more information about qualifying Ministers.

The Missouri Holy Land Pilgrimage Endowment Fund is an endowment, the interest of which is used to generate income for the Holy Land Pilgrimage Fund (above). Commandery Recorders are to ask each Sir Knight on their annual dues statement to remit at least \$3.65 towards the Holy Land Endowment Fund, and Commanderies are encouraged to have fund raisers to generate money for this fund.
