Brother, Companion, and Sir Knight Ronnie Edward Green, 79, cast off the chains binding him to this Earthly realm to be with his Lord and Savior on Saturday, August 9, 2025.

Ronnie was born on November 7, 1945, in St. James, Missouri. He was the son of Buford Edward and Doris Idell (Seabaugh) Green.

On May 7, 2005, at Prince of Peace United Church of Christ in St. Louis, Missouri, he was united in marriage to Margaret Darlene Keys.

Ronnie worked for 40 years as a head meat cutter. For many of those years he was employed by Straub's Market in Clayton, Missouri.

Ronnie enjoyed the great outdoors, spending countless hours riding his Kubota across his property. He had a deep love for hunting, particularly during deer season when he would eagerly invite his friends to join him in the excitement of the hunt. He cultivated a bountiful harvest of blackberries and grapes, always leaving enough for the local squirrels and rabbits to enjoy.

A true lover of the land, Ronnie had a unique passion for moving rocks, often remarking that the Ozarks produced the biggest rocks. His determination and hard work transformed his property into a testament to his love for the earth and its natural beauty.





History is an interesting beast, and the internet is a wonderful tool to research our history. However, when writing any article, please be careful when accepting any information as gospel.

As I sat down to present this to you, I was confused to find out whether Francis Scott Key was a brother of our Fraternity or not. Google AI and the Grand Lodge of North Dakota says he is a Maryland Freemason. However, the Grand Lodge Maryland does not list him as a famous Freemason. Our National Sojourners say that he wasn't a Freemason. Yet, other sources say he was. So, I cannot confirm or deny that Francis Scott Key was a Brother Freemason, but his story on the anniversary of the writing of the Star Spangled Banner is interesting enough that we decided to include it in this publication. —Editor

What is more patriotic than the pledge of allegiance? I would suggest to you that of the Star-Spangled Banner. It is played before sporting events, commemorative ceremonies, military events, etc. As it is played, you will see our citizens rise, remove their hats, and place their hands over their hearts.

The Star-Spangled Banner has been the official national anthem of the United States since 1931. Its history begins in the morning hours of Tuesday, September 13, 1814. When Francis Scott Key was on a British ship, the Tonnant, to negotiate the release of an American civilian, Dr. William Beanes. Though his mission to free Beanes was successful, the British refused to let the Americans leave that ship, fearing they would reveal details on the plan to attack the City of Baltimore. As the British ships were moving into position to attack Fort McHenry, Key would witness the 25-hour bombardment. On the morning of Wednesday, September 14th, Key

was inspired to write a poem, which would become, "The Star-Spangled Banner".

Oh, say can you see by the dawn's early light What so proudly we hailed at the twilight's last gleaming?

Whose broad stripes and bright stars through the perilous fight,

O'er the ramparts we watched were so gallantly streaming.

And the rockets' red glare, the bombs bursting in air,

Gave proof through the night that our flag was still there.

O! say does that star-spangled banner yet wave O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave?



A musical tune would almost immediately be added to his poem. It was set to the then popular melody of the English drinking song, "To Anacreon in Heaven" by John Stafford Smith. The combined poem turned song quickly gained popularity, but it would take 114 years before it became our national anthem.

An Analysis of the Thought Process in the Mark Master Degree

The first section of the Mark Master degree is an allegory based upon Psalms 118:22— "The stone the builders rejected has become the cornerstone". The cornerstone, set in the northeast, marks the beginning of a Mason's spiritual journey, while the keystone, the final piece, signifies completion. This journey progresses from the Entered Apprentice through the Royal Arch degrees, each casting further light resulting from the labor of learning and maturity.(1)

The first section of the Mark Master degree reveals the importance of undertaking this journey with the rejection of the keystone by the pugnacious and functionary Master Overseer—an allegory for those who follow orders without a thought process. His failure to recognize the value of what lies beyond his limited perception highlights the danger of blind obedience and the importance of developing our emotional intelligence throughout our lifetime. (2) Freemasonry provides that thought process.

Central to Freemasonry is the moral application of the compasses, particularly the charge to "circumscribe our desires and keep our passions within due bounds." Crucially, in Masonic philosophy, passions are not base emotions, but rather irrational beliefs and unexamined assumptions that imprison the mind and inhibit virtue. Thus, the true labor of a Freemason is inner—discerning truth, resisting dogma, and liberating thought from bias.(3) That's the 'Free' in Freemason!

This essay's core argument is that our fraternity exists not merely to practice ritual or manage tradition (which are very important), but also as a guide to conscious mental development. A raison d'être of the Craft lies in cultivating reflection, breaking habitual mental patterns, and fostering the kind of clarity that leads to harmony with oneself and - just as important - with all of mankind: We call this empathy.

The Bicameral Mind – Julian Jaynes

Julian Jaynes' The Origin of Consciousness in the Breakdown of the Bicameral Mind explores the nature and origins of consciousness, arguing that it is far more limited than we perceive. He suggests that much of our cognitive processing happens unconsciously, with conscious awareness acting as a thin layer atop instinct and learned behavior. Jaynes theorizes that early human societies were governed by the "bicameral mind," in which individuals experienced auditory hallucinations—interpreted as divine commands and similar to a dream state not unlike psychosis—guiding their decisions. This system, he claims, was functional as long as societies were strictly hierarchical, but around 3,000 years ago, environmental and social upheaval led to the decline of these "voices", forcing humans to develop introspective thought. Examining The Iliad, Jaynes posits that its characters lack self-awareness and act only under divine instruction, whereas The Odyssey reflects the emergence of inner contemplation, marking the shift to modern consciousness.

Javnes' theory remains controversial influential, inspiring discussions in philosophy, psychology, and neuroscience. While critics point inconsistencies—such as moments introspection in The Iliad—his ideas have resonated with thinkers like Daniel Dennett and Antonio Damasio, who recognize the role of language in shaping human cognition. Behavioral economics and neuroscience continue exploring unconscious decision-making, a major theme in Jaynes' work. Despite skepticism, his hypothesis invites ongoing debate about the origins and mechanics of human consciousness, solidifying its place as a provocative and enduring concept.(4)

The Square and Compasses - Pike

Albert Pike presents Freemasonry as an allegorical journey from ignorance and intellectual enslavement to self-mastery and enlightenment. The candidate for initiation represents every person beginning in darkness—dominated by instincts, passions, and external control. The symbolic tools of Masonry—the square and compasses—mirror his transformation in our ritual:

At first, both points of the compasses lie beneath the square, symbolizing where moral sense and reason are subdued by animal appetites and desires. As the initiate becomes a Fellowcraft, one compass point rises above the square, reflecting his emerging self-awareness and the beginning of moral and intellectual resistance against base impulses and mindless following. Finally, as a Master Mason, both compass points rise above the square—signifying the triumph of virtue and wisdom over the material and emotional chaos of human nature. This state, where reason and morality govern desire, marks a harmonious balance and spiritual excellence worthy of honor.(5)

The Way of the Craftsman - MacNulty

The Law of Opposites in Freemasonry is depicted through various symbols, such as the checkered pavement, parallel lines, and architectural columns, demonstrating unity between contrasting forces. The parallel lines represent figures like Moses and Solomon or the Saints John, signifying opposing yet complementary aspects of governance and divinity. As the checkered pavement symbolizes the prevalence of good and evil in one's life, Strength and Beauty, embodied in the Doric and Corinthian columns, highlight the interplay between scientific and artistic thought.

However, beyond symbolizing opposing forces, the Law of Opposites introduces the Rule of Three—a principle stating that balance is achieved through the mediation of a third force. This idea appears in Masonic teachings as Wisdom, Strength, and Beauty, and it also applies to physical, psychological, and philosophical dynamics.

The Rule of Three maintains that there is equilibrium in various systems, from physical processes like metabolism to psychological structures, where libido (instincts for life) and mortido (instincts for destruction) are harmonized by consciousness. In Masonic philosophy, these forces correspond to Wisdom, Strength, and Beauty, reflecting a broader psychological model explored by thinkers like Jung and Freud. Ultimately, while the Law of Opposites states there are fundamental dualities in existence, the Rule of Three facilitates their regulation, creating stability within individuals, systems, and society.

"The Rule of Three forms the basis of most Masonic labor; and we will come to realize how loudly our ancient brethren spoke when they said:"

• 'If a Master-Mason you would be; Observe you well the Rule of Three.'(6)

Conclusion:

There is no question that portions of the Blue Lodge ritual and the arrangement of the Lodge borrow heavily from the Kabbalah. This is well documented. Of most relevance here is the allegory of the pillars of Wisdom, Strength, and Beauty depicted on the tracing board, with the pillar of Strength on the left, the pillar of Beauty on the right,

and the pillar of Wisdom in the center. This would imply that the ideal psychological state is logic and reason (the pillar of Strength) in balance with intuition and spirituality (the pillar of Beauty) under the control of enlightened consciousness (the pillar of Wisdom).

Via this architecture, we are not only free to choose our destiny, but we must also take responsibility for it through lifelong learning and self-improvement. Further, we must accept our obligation to contribute to the well-being of others. This is shown as the path to the divine realm as depicted by the ladder, marked with the symbols of Faith, Hope, and Charity leading to the Glory.

This trestle board is, in fact, a map. Not only of a well-balanced mind having evolved from ignorance to enlightenment, but also within the larger context of society and our struggle with the choices between good and evil and our relationship with others, especially the less fortunate: A reward for a life well-lived is God's Kingdom on Earth, the Heredom (note the key besides Hope on Jacob's Ladder).

Another Lesson in Poverty

Almost immediately there is a small play enacted in which there is a knock at the door and an apparently impoverished Brother has his mark presented to the newest member of the Lodge, seeking relief. The Candidate being unable to comply is asked to return the mark with a quarter of a dollar, being the equivalent of a half shekel of silver. Having been divested of metal he cannot comply with this either. At this point all the Brethren offer to help the Candidate fulfill his obligation.

Interestingly, a variation in the oldest ritual in New York, practiced by Ancient Chapter Number 1 which was founded some time prior to Webb's codification of the ritual, the Master slips the money into the Candidate's pocket. He is then told to 'seek and ye shall find', a reference to the gospel of Matthew 7:7. He does, and discovers he is not 'entirely destitute' after all.

The similarity of this action with what occurs in the Entered Apprentice Degree, when the Candidate is asked to deposit 'some metallic substance' with the Secretary, is apparent. Indeed, there are many signs which indicate that the Mark Degree developed at least in parallel with the Entered Apprentice Degree, and shared a period of cross-fertilization, resulting in a number of symbols and part of the ritual being common to both. In addition to the request for metallic substance from the Candidate, the reference to "seek and ye shall find" in an early form of the ritual mentioned above is remarkably similar to that section of the Lecture of Reasons in the Entered Apprentice Degree which reminds us that the three distinct knocks given at the door of the Lodge are related to the same passage of scripture. The Due Guard also reminds us of the 'attentive ear' and 'whispering wise counsel into a Brother's ear.'

The Signs, Grips and Words

The first sign is the Grand Hailing Sign or Sign of Distress and recalls how the Brother was shown to carry and present his work. Being a Sign of Distress, it is not used elsewhere during the ceremony; it is largely added for completeness' sake, since Masons have a far more visible and well-known Sign of Distress given to them in the Third Degree, and no doubt would resort to that one if in trouble. The Principal or 'Heave over' Sign refers to the rejection

of the Keystone, which is made over the left shoulder. The Due Guard and Sign have been explained earlier. These latter three signs need to be known since they are used at the Opening of a Chapter. The pass Grip and word derive from the first scriptural reading and the explanation that the wood from the cedars of Lebanon were floated down the coast to Joppa, where the coast was very steep, requiring those on top of the bluff to help the workmen ascend. The harbor is one of the oldest in the world. The password reflects this story, and the grip is what would indeed be used to drag a person upwards. From a symbolic viewpoint, this grip also represents the act of raising a person from one level to a higher one, which is appropriate for a degree which reminds us that we are advancing further in Freemasonry.

The real grip and word are taken from Ezekiel, and according to Duncan's Monitor the name is 'Siroc or Mark Well'. The body forms the outline of the letters, and the hands now take on a grip which is far less robust than the pass grip. Now, instead of the strong fingers being bound in a grip, the two weakest fingers are locked, perhaps indicating the level of trust between the two Brothers.

Finding the Stone Which Was Lost

At this point in the ceremony three Craftsmen study the plans of the Trestleboard and realize the keystone is missing. It is interesting to note that, while many Mark Lodges use the Overseers for this part of the ritual, this is incorrect: if the Overseers had seen the design, they would have immediately recognized both the shape and the mark upon the stone. This review must be performed by three different Brothers, who represent those supervising the work itself, while the overseers represent an administrative role only.

Once the lack of the keystone has been identified, the Senior Warden informs the Right Worshipful master, who tells the Marshal to 'transmit the mark' to the Senior Warden. The mark he gives him to transmit is one of the coins – the Penny – which well later be given to the Candidates at the end of the ceremony. The Senior Warden uses this to show the assembled Overseers what the stone looks like, and they immediately recognize it as the one they rejected. The fact that the mark needs to be shown to the Senior Warden (Hiram King of Tyre) shows that the only two people who knew what it looked like were King Solomon and Hiram Abif. This may shed more light on the passage form Ezekiel, since it implies that only the King (prince or ruler) was worthy to commune with God an receive the divine plans for His Temple. This idea that the design of the stone was somehow secret or 'hidden' is later reflected in the scriptural verse 'to him that overcometh will I give to eat of the hidden manna, and I will give him a white stone, and in the stone a new name written which no man knoweth, saving he that receiveth it." (Revelation Chapter 2, Verse 17).

A search is made, and the keystone is found. In some versions the keystone is subtly moved during the preceding part of the ritual, so it is not in the place expected. In other variants it is the Candidate himself who finds it. However, in the Webb version the three Craftsmen locate the stone 'among the rubbish' where it is was placed at the start of the ceremony, carry it to the Senior Warden, who compares it to the mark, and has the Overseers carry it up to the Right Worshipful Master. He admonishes the disgraced Overseers with four scriptural readings, each emphasized with blows of the gavel. This is a most powerful moment, and yet it will seem unfair that the Master blames the Overseers who. due to his secrecy, had no idea what the stone would look like.

It is also of note that the scriptural passages refer to the cornerstone, which begins the foundation of a new edifice' while the stone in question is the key stone, which finishes off the building. However, the lessons apply to both, since both are critical to the establishment and endurance of the building. In the Entered Apprentice Degree, the Candidate is told he is a cornerstone and positioned in the Northeast corner of the Lodge. Now he represents the completion of the building, as the symbolic keystone.

It is interesting to note the similarities of this section with the Master Mason Degree. Since we are taught that we are 'living stones', this white stone bearing a person's mark – or name -stands in for that person. As in the Master Mason Degree the stone was thrown into the rubbish, as if dead, by three senior Masons. Its absence was noted, and 'strict search' was made for it. On its being found it was carried up to King Solomon who admonished those three who had thrown it over in the first place. Now the worth is recognized, and it will occupy a key position in the Temple.

A final point, perhaps, given the Christian roots

of many of the Biblical refences, is a message of universal hope form the Gospel of Luke 15:4-6. In this the Nazarene talks of the Shepherd who, losing one sheep out of a hundred, nevertheless goes to find it, and when he does, he lays it on his shoulders and comes home rejoicing. They say a husbandman can recognize the cry of his animals, even to the individual sheep, goat or cow. Perhaps from this we can draw the hope that, even if we, as a Peculiar Stone, are cast aside and left in the rubbish heap, yet God who knows us and gave us a secret name will come to his kingdom rejoicing that he has found us.

Historical Lecture


The Lecture which follows offers a pause in the action. All are seated and the Master or assigned Brother fives an explanation of the ritual up to this point. He reveals the meaning of the letters on the stone (H.T.W.S.S.T.K.S.). It is noteworthy that these are written in a circular pattern, between two engraved circles, which once again emphasize the use of the compasses in this second series of Degrees.

Given that this Degree is a combination of two original Degrees, Mark Man which required a Fellowcraft to produce a piece of 'good work, true work, square work', and Mark Master, which required the employment of compasses to produce a keystone, we need to seek what lesson the rejection and rediscovery are trying to teach us.

We must remember that it is not only the Overseers who are ignorant of the function of the keystone. The Candidate is also alleged to have "found it in the quarries and concluding it designed for some portion of the Temple, brought it up.' The ritual implies he was working on a regular (i.e. square) piece of work and set that down in order to take this stone instead, since he emphatically tells the Overseers that it is not his own work. The Candidate comes with clean hands.



Why did the Fellowcraft lay down his square stone and pick up a stone which contained elements designed by compasses? We are taught in the Blue Degrees that the compasses represent God (indeed, who can forget the magnificent Ancient of Days by William Blake?). While he cannot see the true significance of the keystone, he senses that his development, which up to now has focused on duty, has lacked a spiritual element. By gravitating towards a stone which contains arcs and circles, he is reaching out to that spiritual side just as the physical Temple is nearing completion. He is sound in mind and body: now he seeks to work upon his soul. But what of the Overseers? They represent those who mechanically go through the motions, who are accomplished enough in the basic skills but who have not yet grasped the higher purpose of speculative Freemasonry. It also tells us that even the lowly Fellowcraft can rise above his situation and make this journey if he applies himself diligently enough.

At the simplest level, the Degree teaches us that life is fraught with disappointments, and that we must persevere before our initially rejected ideas or actions are finally recognized for what they are, and we finally receive our just reward. But it is man's lot in life to endure hardship, misunderstanding and unjust treatment. In this he reminds us of King David, Solomon's father, who designed the Temple but was forbidden to build it himself. The Address to the Candidate refers to this, and reminds him that, even if he is rejected of men and persecuted, he will always find reliable and constant friends among Mark Master Masons, and that his rejected labors will one day be recognized and rewarded.



Another theme is that the stone now bears a name or mark. Previously we, as Masons, have labored upon the Spiritual Temple. The Hermetic axiom 'As Above, So Below' has led us to realize that, just as we symbolically build the Temple of stone below, so we are creating that Spiritual Temple not built with hands in heaven; and that our actions on earth will be judged on another plane. We are now sufficiently advanced in our Masonic career to place our name or mark upon our, so that it will be clearly identified as ours. We now take personal responsibility for our actions.

The lesson on charity is more emphatic in this Degree than in the Entered Apprentice Degree. In that Degree we were asked for some metallic substance to be placed in the annals of the Lodge. However, in this Degree there is a direct and personal application to our

charitable nature. This is appropriate at this level, for we are forcibly reminded that we are judged by our actions, and if Charity is the greatest of the theological virtues, the practice of charity will accelerate our success in creating the Spiritual Temple.

In this Degree, much is made of the keystone being 'stone which was lost but now found', a theme which will be reintroduced in the Royal Arch Degree. Perhaps the most important lesson here is the fact that especially if we consider the Most Excellent Master Degree as the second part of the Mark Degree - we have the completion of the earthly Temple. Already, while the Temple is nearing completion we see fleeting images of the true purpose of the Masonic cycle: that the Temple must be destroyed and rebuilt within ourselves for us to recover Truth. Hiram is an avatar. and while we watch his death from afar in the Drama of the Master Mason Degree, we dimly perceive that we ourselves must die in order that the germ of Truth within us must grow and blossom. Our contentment with receiving a substitute for Truth in the Master Masons Degree has been gnawing at us, and on finding a stone in the quarry which represents the last step in the earthly Temple and the first step of the spiritual Temple, we run to grasp it, not yet understanding its full meaning, but aware that it is of great importance. We are told that this wisdom is not yet for us, and we return to the quarries to continue work on the earthly Temple. However, our reward later in the Degree is to learn that there is indeed a purely spiritual Temple, and that the stone we found, while being temporarily rejected for the physical Temple, will play a major role in the Temple to come.

Whatever happened to the New Masonic Temple??? Assembled by; Larry Wilson

The Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Missouri has not always been located in the City of Columbia. Once upon a time it was housed in a magnificent temple in Downtown St. Louis. Even though it is nearly 100 years old, it still stands today. The structure was named the New Masonic Temple. Ground was broken in 1923 and dedicated in 1926. Its design was created by the architectural company Eames & Young with consulting architect Albert B. Groves. It features classic Greek Ionic-style exterior architecture with various styles throughout the interior. The 386,000-square-foot building stands 185 feet high and encloses more than six million cubic feet. There are 14 levels: six full floors and eight mezzanines.



The Masonic Temple is built in three receding stages, symbolic of the three steps in Masonry. Constructed of Bedford limestone with gray granite trim, the main lobby is finished in marble; other rooms had their original wool carpet. The building had an unfinished theater designed to hold 2,200 seats.

The lobby contains a 38-foot mural titled "The Origins of Freemasonry", which was created in 1941 by African American artist Jessie Housley Holliman. Dedicated by Senator Harry S. Truman, it is the only surviving mural by the noted artist in a St. Louis public building.




Then-Senator and Grand Master Harry S Truman kept an office in the building. Charles A. Lindbergh was initiated and participated as a Freemason at this Temple before his renowned 1927 flight. In 1980, Escape from New York with Ernest Borgnine filmed a scene on the Temple's steps. Borgnine, a Mason, attended Masonic meetings in the building.

The second floor contained the Eastern Star quarters. Third and fourth floors were designed to house the Blue Lodges with the potential for eight Blue Lodge halls. The four halls and the fourth floor were not completed, and one area on the third floor was made into a dining room.

Fifth and sixth floors were designed to house three of the York Rite organizations, which are known as the Chapter, Council, and the Commandery. Most of the building is non-sectarian, but the fifth-floor features Christian symbolism. The fifth level hall is 100' long, 75' wide and 48' high. It was named a city landmark in 1976.

The New Masonic Temple was sold in 2018 to a private developer who has turned this magnificent building into an apartment complex named the B on Lindell. This property now offers 144 apartments, while preserving temple's limestone exterior. The project was completed by Brandonview LLC, a company run by Saint Louis University graduate Brian Hayden.

The B on Lindell offers a variation on that idea; after gutting the interior, Brandonview built a parking garage in the center, creating a building-within-a-building design that will eventually allow parking spots right in front of many of the apartment spaces. The upper floors are still under construction.

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


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Bottom Line Up Front for this Edition In Order to retain people You Must Do Stuff!

The driving force behind this new corporation was Most Puissant General Grand Master Ben Mandlebaum, of the General Grand Council, Cryptic Masons International. Companion Joe Lewis, Attorney at Law, was instrumental in quickly getting the Foundation a tax-exempt status. CMMRF also had a tax attorney, James A. Hogue, PMIGM in These men generously donated their Oklahoma. time to the initial start-up of the Foundation. Earlier, at the meeting of the "General Grand Council Benevolent Foundation, Inc. held on November 11, 1985, Marion Keith Crum, Past Most Illustrious Grand Master of the Grand Council, Cryptic Masons of Indiana, was elected Executive Secretary of the Most Illustrious Companion Crum Foundation. continued to faithfully serve in this position until his retirement in October 2012, a period of almost twenty-seven years.

CMMRF funds research at Indiana University School of Medicine in Indianapolis, Indiana. Initial research focused on the cause(s) and eventually a cure for atherosclerosis and its complications. In later years, the research has implemented adult stem cell therapies to address a variety of mature health issues but not necessarily restricted to the adult population. This research was previously funded by an Indiana corporation, which ceased to do business upon the death of Dr. Owen L. Shanteau, October 17, 1985. While CMMRF is not a part of that preceding organization and the General Grand Council was not its governing body, CMMRF is continuing the good work that it started. Shanteau met with Dr. Nils Bang at the Indiana University Medical Center in 1978 and discussed this new venture. Dr. Shanteau was able to give a grant of \$12,000.00 a year to this project, which was being done on a part time basis. The former Foundation gave the Medical Center grants totaling \$96,000.00.

Dr. Nils Bang, one of the founding researchers connected with the program, suggested that the most efficient way of investing the money donated by The

Cryptic Masons International was to invest it in the salaries of young, talented investigators. Many of these investigators had papers summarizing their work accepted for presentation at the prestigious national conference of the American Federation for Clinical Research. (In order to have papers accepted, the subject matter must have been about new findings, not previously published.) All of these Doctors have moved on to more substantial positions and are no longer at Indiana University. CMMRF assumes they are still using their experience in the various fields of research.

At the February 1996 Board of Trustees meeting in Washington D.C. The Board agreed to fund a Chair at the Indiana University Medical Center at the cost of one million dollars. CMMRF contributed two hundred thousand dollars a year for five years to endow the chair. The final payment was made in December of 2000. The University offered as an incentive to guarantee a five per cent income on the endowment plus matching it with a five percent payout from the endowment.

Sometime in 2001-2002 the CMMRF-sponsored laboratory became the Indiana Center for Vascular Biology and Medicine, (ICVBM). After a 3-year search for the best person to fill this newly created Chair, Dr. Keith March was selected. The creation of an endowed chair and this new Center attracted more than \$2,000,000 from non-Masonic sources. Dr. March served in this position until his resignation September 30, 2017. After an in-depth search, Dr. Jay Hess, Dean of the Indiana University School of Medicine, announced on July 17, 2018, that Dr. Michael P. Murphy had been selected as the next holder of the Cryptic Masons Medical Research Foundation Chair.

In 2007, a non-Masonic benefactor challenged CMMRF to match his \$50,000.00 donation to the Indiana Center of Vascular Biology and Medicine. By meeting his challenge, CMMRF contributed \$300,000.00 to ICVBM in 2007. In 2008 a Cryptic Mason donated \$20,000.00 which CMMRF matched and it enabled CMMRF to give \$240,000.00 to the Center for research. Today, upon requests, CMMRF will match \$5,000 donations, up to \$25,000.

The mission of the Knights Templar Eye Foundation, Inc. is to provide assistance to those who face loss of sight due to the need for surgical treatment without regard to race, color, creed, age, sex, or national origin provided they are unable to pay or receive adequate assistance from current government agencies or similar sources and to provide funds for research in curing diseases of the eye. This includes the correction of strabismus (cross eyes) in children up to the age of 16 years.

Funds for the operation of the Eye Foundation are obtained in part from an annual assessment of each Knight Templar, contributions made by Masons from throughout the Masonic Family, fund-raising activities, memorials, wills and bequests, and donations from endowment funds or similar sources. Special award programs for contributions include the Grand Master's Sword of Merit (\$25,000), Golden Chalice (\$10,000), Grand Master's Club (\$1,000), Grand Commander's Club (\$1,000 in \$100 annual installments), Patron Certificate (\$100), Associate Patron Certificate (\$50), and Life Sponsor (\$30). Those who are designated as a Life Sponsor or above are relieved from the annual assessment.

Since 1956, over \$98 million has been spent on approved cases, and applications have been received from 80,000 people. Research Grants totaling in excess of \$9.2 million have been awarded to researchers working in the fields of Pediatric Ophthalmology and Ophthalmic Genetics.

Application for assistance from the Foundation can be made through a Knight Templar who is a member of one of over 1.200 Constituent Commanderies the Grand of Encampment. The Knights Templar Eye Foundation, Inc. is a co-sponsor of the Seniors Eye Care Program (formally known as the National Eye Care Project) with Eye Care America, a Public Service Foundation of the American Academy of Ophthalmology. The Seniors Eye Care Program helps those persons 65 years or over who do not have an Ophthalmologist. Anyone wishing to contact the Seniors Eye Care Program may do so by calling 1- 800-222-EYES and telling them you were referred by a Knight Templar.

The Knight of Siloam special award program in Missouri was created by Sir Knights J. Edward Blinn, REPGC, and Danny L. Ferguson, REPGC, during the 93-94 Templar year as a means of recognizing those Missouri Sir Knights who make substantial contributions to the Knights Templar Eye Foundation, and to encourage others to do so. A special medal and patent is presented to those who donate \$500.00 or more to KTEF either in a lump sum or in installments. The jewel is designated as a meritorious service jewel and may be worn on the Knight.

The Knights Templar Educational Foundation, Division of the Grand Commandery of the State of Missouri, provides financial assistance in the way of low cost student loans to college juniors and seniors, as well as trade school students.



The Missouri Holy Land Pilgrimage Fund is used to pay the expenses of sending a Minister to the Holy Land under the provisions of the Grand Encampment. The Holy Land Pilgrimage Committee of the Grand Commandery can provide more information about qualifying Ministers.

The Missouri Holy Land Pilgrimage Endowment Fund is an endowment, the interest of which is used to generate income for the Holy Land Pilgrimage Fund (above). Commandery Recorders are to ask each Sir Knight on their annual dues statement to remit at least \$3.65 towards the Holy Land Endowment Fund, and Commanderies are encouraged to have fund raisers to generate money for this fund.
